Publisher revamps website

Nature Coast Web Design and Marketing is hired

TRI-COUNTY AREA – With the death of Web Wizard (Aviator and Photographer) Bill Kilborn on Oct. 16, certain administrative duties were unable to be completed for *HardisonInk.com*, and as a result it became necessary to revamp the whole website.

Owner and publisher Jeff M. Hardison commented about the site after the Oct. 16 demise of his friend.

“I was able to update pages through about 3 p.m. on Tuesday (Oct. 20),” he said. “Then, I was alerted to an issue that only Bill or someone of a skill level that is higher than mine could cure. I communicated with people at three companies that provide people with access to servers, and with three website developers. Those can be different realms, by the way.”

Nature Coast Web Design and Marketing was selected on Oct. 22 to be the company to replace Journey1.net. Ryan Kirby worked very hard to move everything from one server to another server, and he established the required new method for website updating by Hardison.

“I foresee a good continuing business relationship with Nature Coast Web Design and Marketing,” Hardison said. “These guys say what they mean, and they do what they say they are going to do. I am thankful they had space to fit me into their group of clients.”

As for the future of HardisonInk.com, the owner said “all systems are go” to keep growing the site.

“I have a little story to share,” Hardison said. “Five years ago, when I first started, Bill told me that it may be some period of time before cPanel or other robotic counters registered views on my pages. It happened even quicker than Bill predicted.”

“There is going to be some front-end work that is taking me out of circulation to cover some events today (Saturday),” he continued. “However, God willing, I will be able to attend Sunday school and church tomorrow.”

The publisher said he grabbed some thoughts on how to deal with the death of a friend and vital business associate.
