It was another beautiful day for shoppers at the Chiefland Farmers Flea Market, and for people who enjoy looking at show cars and trucks, the Tri-County Cruisers Summer Car Show and Swap Meet was a resounding success. This event has been happening for several summers now, but the heat of June is leading the Tri-County Cruisers to lean more toward not having this one.

Griffeth is a big sponsor for the Tri-County Cruisers when the group conducts car, truck and motorcycle shows at the Chiefland Farmer's Flea Market. For this show, he donated \$400 for the Top 10 (\$40 each), \$50 to the Sponsor's Pick and \$100 to the Best of Show, as well as

working with the Tri-County Cruisers to provide those 12 trophies and the President's Pick Trophy and the \$1,000 donation to the Chiefland Fire Rescue Department.

Gary Hooper won the Best of Show Trophy and \$100 with his red 1934 Ford. This vehicle has an engine that provides 425 horsepower, Hooper said as he accepted the trophy.

The Sponsor's Pick (Sonny's Choice) was a burgundy-colored 1933 Plymouth sedan owned by Neil Mahar. He won a trophy and \$50.

The President's Pick (Tri-County Cruisers President Doug Mitchell of Trenton) was Fred R. with a 1986 Mazda.

The Top 10 trophies went to (in no particular order of ranking) Phil Nelson with his 1957 Chevy; Scott Henry with 1954 Ford truck; John Nordone with his 2012 Ford Mustang; Robert Talsma with his 1967 Chevrolet Camaro; J & J Thomas with a 1957 Chevy; Marion Hooper with a 1933 Ford Sedan delivery vehicle ("Wooly Bully") {she said her husband did all of the work}; Mike McCormack with a 1967 Dodge Dart; Neil Mahar with a 1933 Plymouth sedan; John Kirster with a 2014 Ford Mustang; and Steve Metz with a 1964 Chevy Nova SS.
